As stewards of the waste water treatment plant, Salida Sanitary District focuses on fiscal responsibility, system maintenance and performance, protection of the environment, and overall effectiveness. Revenues are collected through sewer usage fees and are used for infrastructure, maintenance and overall safe operations of the sewer system. Through our arrangement with the County, your sewer service is charged and collected with property taxes twice a year.

Rate Study Results

The goal of the rate study was to fund the cost of providing sewer service while equitably distributing costs among all customers.

Did you know that the District...

- Operates and maintains over 42.71 miles of sewer pipe
- Serves a population of 13,000 with over 4,200 customers
- Educates kids on how to help keep their home sewer systems running smoothly with activity booklets distributed at the library
- Offers tours for local, community schools
- Attends and operates at the Salida Festival
- Has partnered with the microbiology department of California State University, Stanislaus, for the past 5 years, providing students with hands on research projects and experience studying Salida's wastewater.

As part of the District's objective to continue operating responsibly, a sewer rate study has been conducted over the last year. Rate studies are typically performed every 5 years to ensure that rates are adequately funding sewer operations, maintenance and future capital needs. Rate studies include 3 areas: a revenue requirement analysis, a cost of service analysis and a rate design analysis.

The results of the study focus on three findings.


- **RESERVES**: Currently the District does not have a reserve fund sufficient for long-term financial viability should an unexpected fluctuation in revenue or expenditures arise. Therefore, a reserve fund is needed.
- **DEBT REPAYMENT:** In addition to regularly budgeted line items, the District needs to collect funds to repay a loan that is maturing in 2021 which includes an agreed upon debt coverage ratio. The loan was issued to fund capital improvements to the sewer system. This debt service and required coverage has been added to the funding requirement for current and future fiscal years.

TOTAL FUNDING NEEDED: This includes operations and maintenance expenses, reserve funding and capital project funding. The projected total funding needed over the next 5 years ranges from \$2.4 million to 2.7 million.

Based on the results of the study, the District is proposing to increase sewer service charges to fund the increasing cost of operations, to finance the maintenance and repair of aging infrastructure and to restore reserve funds that have been depleted during the recent economic recession. If adopted, the proposed rate change will become effective for fiscal year 2016-17 and will appear on annual property tax bills. The average increase for residential customers will be 4% a year.
